Preparing and presenting an e-posters

Abstract: The abstract should be a total 400 words minimum and 600 words maximum. The abstract should be a single paragraph and should follow the style of structured abstracts, but without headings but without headings: 1) Introduction; 2) Detailed Methods: Describe the main methods or treatments applied. Include any relevant preregistration numbers, and species and strains of any animals used. 3) Results/discussion: Summarize the article's main findings and provides a substantial amount of new information; 4) Conclusion: Indicate the main conclusions or interpretations; 5) References.

Introduction: The introduction should briefly place the study in a broad context. It should define the purpose of the work and its significance, including specific hypotheses being tested. The current state of the research field should be reviewed carefully, and key publications cited.

Finally, briefly mention the main aim of the work. Keep the introduction comprehensible to scientists working outside the topic or your work.

Materials and Methods: They should be described with sufficient detail to allow others to replicate and build on published results. New methods and protocols should be described in detail while well-established methods can be briefly described and appropriately cited. Give the name and version of any software used and make clear whether computer code used is available. Include any pre-registration codes. When reporting on research that involves human subjects, human material, human tissues, or human data, authors must declare that the investigations were approved by the ethics committee defined for it. This approval must be available at the time of defense to the members of the scientific committee that will evaluate each work

Results/discussion: Provide a concise and precise description of the experimental results, their interpretation as well as the experimental conclusions. Authors should discuss the results and how they can be interpreted in perspective of previous studies and of the working hypotheses. The findings and their implications should be discussed in the broadest context possible and limitations of the work highlighted. Future research directions may also be mentioned.

Conclusion: Should provide readers with a brief summary of the main conclusions

CREATING E-POSTERS USING POWERPOINT

A poster is a large piece of paper designed to disseminate information, for example at a seminar. An e-poster is similar to a regular printed poster. The main difference is its online format, which enables it to be distributed electronically, and often as a PDF file. E-posters are normally used when the final poster is to be displayed on a large screen, and therefore resolution and size needs to be taken into consideration. Many platforms can be used for creating a poster, however, the benefit of using PowerPoint (PPT) is that it is easily accessible, familiar and easy to use, and it can support large slide sizes.

SIZE:

For e-posters, a 16:9 widescreen format is usually used. A common size is 40.97"×23.04" or 104.06cm ×58.52cm. Make sure the orientation of your poster is Landscape.

FONT SIZE & TEXT DISPLAY:

To be easily readable, the font needs to be appropriate for the size of the poster. Having a size 12 font on an A1-sized poster is not ideal, as the amount of text will be overwhelming. Similarly, a too-large font size means you will not be able to fit all the information on the

poster. For a poster of the size recommended in this helpsheet (see Slide size section above), a font size of 28pt for the body text is desirable, with the headings in a larger font. Usually, PPT will adjust the font size to be reasonable for the chosen slide size.
